About Us

The Gorge Waterway Action Society (GWAS) is a registered charity dedicated to preserving and enhancing the Gorge Waterway in Victoria, BC. We are a small, passionate team committed to environmental education and ecological health in a place rich with biological and cultural significance. We are honoured to help steward these lands. We humbly acknowledge and respect the lək'wəŋən Peoples, the Songhees and x^wsepsəŋ (Esquimalt) Nations, on whose traditional and unceded territories we work, and T'Sou-ke, W̱SÁNEĆ and other First Nations peoples whose historical relationships with the land and water continue to this day.

At our core is the Gorge Waterway Nature House in Esquimalt Gorge Park: a hub of place-based, hands-on, youth-focused environmental education. We aim to engage with and educate our community on local ecosystems, climate change, and the environmental issues that surround us. We also conduct restoration and biology work in Esquimalt Gorge Park and the surrounding area, taking on a variety of projects that support the ecological health of the Gorge Waterway.

Job Description

GWAS seeks a motivated individual to join our team as a Climate Interpreter. Our Climate Team aims to:

- educate the community on climate change science, effects, mitigation, and adaptation;
- promote understanding of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals, with a focus on goals (13) Climate Action; (14) Life Below Water; and (15) Life On Land;
- research and communicate relevant, applicable climate change data;
- assist the Township of Esquimalt in meeting its climate goals;
- further integrate GWAS into the climate community;
- work with our climate partner organizations, including the Esquimalt Climate Organizers, the South Island Climate Action Network, the West Coast Climate Action Network, and the BC Climate Emergency Campaign, and working on projects with the BC Climate Action Secretariat; and
- integrate climate into all aspects of the organization.

Our Climate Interpreters are responsible for creating and delivering youth-focused, place-based climate change education through the Gorge Waterway Nature House, planning climate outreach events, and integrating climate-forward policies and practices across our organization. Additional responsibilities may include creating digital educational content, working with our Restoration Technicians and Biologists to identify and understand climate change data, writing grants, researching, working with the municipal, provincial and federal governments to help meet their climate goals, and building relationships with other climate-focused organizations.

This year, the Climate Team will focus on producing and updating our educational content and programming to communicate actionable steps that can be taken by individuals, applying a climate-change educational lens to community and organizational events throughout the summer, and better incorporating climate throughout the organization, including an organizational climate-change strategy. They will collaborate with the Sustainability Interpreters and Nature Interpreters to lead climate-related community programming. This position offers some flexibility in the projects our staff pursue, and we also encourage our staff to propose, design, and implement projects that interest them.

This position is hybrid, with work conducted both in person and from home. In-person work is conducted in Esquimalt Gorge Park and around the Gorge Waterway. If you have any concerns about working from home or in person, we still encourage you to apply, and we will accommodate your needs as best we can.

About You

You are passionate about climate education and want to make a difference in your community. You may have an educational background in earth and ocean sciences, environmental studies, biology, geography, education, restoration, Indigenous studies, climate, or related lived experiences. You are driven, able to work independently, eager to learn, and self-motivated. Your values align with GWAS, and you believe in our mission.

You may have some experience with:

- environmental education, particularly youth environmental education;
- public outreach, communicating with the public, and event planning;
- researching, reading, and understanding scientific data;
- climate education, advocacy, or organizing; and
- creating and delivering presentations.

We encourage you to apply if you don't meet these experiences exactly but have aligned or adjacent skills and experiences.

As a Canada Summer Jobs (CSJ) position, you must also be between 15 and 30 years of age at the start of employment; a Canadian citizen, permanent resident, or person to whom refugee protection has been conferred under the *Immigration and Refugee Protection Act* for the duration of the employment; and have a valid Social Insurance Number at the start of employment and be legally entitled to work in Canada per relevant provincial or territorial legislation and regulations.
